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Purpose of BMC Amendments

- Allow uses permitted by State law while protecting community and youth.
- Council to consider:
 - Providing additional operational standards related to products, signage and safety information
 - Expanding Cultivation locations
 - Clarifying operational and development standards for Storefront Retailers
 - Allowing Consumption Lounges and Delivery-Only Retailers

Ordinance consideration timeline

Fall 2018

Pre 2018 – Adopted specific language for dispensaries and cultivators Council adopted complete supply chain regulations and provided direction on other issues

January 28, 2020

Follow-up cannabis items to Council

BMC Amendments

- Amends 12.21 General Regulations
- Amends 12.22 Operating Standards
- Amends 20.40 Advertising Regulations
- Rescinds and readopts 23C.25 Cannabis Uses
- Amends Sub-Titles 23E and 23F Zoning Ordinance provisions and definitions

Process for Identifying Recommendations

- Multi-departmental staff working group
- Research into best practices in other cities
- Input from commissions
- Intent of recommendations is to provide Council with options to consider:
 - Modified language reflects staff recommendations
 - Alternate recommendations from commissions are also highlighted

Prohibition of Products Attractive to Youth

- 1. Additional local rules to prohibit sale, manufacture and packaging of products attractive to children? (12.22.035)
 - Protect children and youth
 - State already has regulations and enforcement to prohibit packaging/labelling/advertising attractive to children

<u>Limitation on Products Sold at</u> <u>Retailers</u>

- 2. Prohibit sale of:
 - a. flavored smoking and vaping products;
 - b. cannabis-infused beverages; and
 - c. non-cannabis merchandise? (12.22.040.J)
 - Concern that flavored products are particularly attractive to youth (normalization of cannabis)
 - Local prohibition would only limit Berkeley businesses

Warning Signs at Retailers

- 3. Require additional warning signage? (12.22.040.E.7, 8, 9)
 - Additional signs would communicate additional health/safety warnings and information
 - City currently requires 5 warning signs be displayed
 - Any/all signs require Public Health staff review for accuracy


Cannabis Logos on Signage

- 4. Restrict cannabis logos on signage? (20.40.130.D)
 - Would reduce visual presence of cannabis, limit normalization of cannabis to youth
 - Allow existing businesses to use existing logo

Allowable Locations for Cannabis Cultivation

- 5. Allow cultivation businesses to locate beyond the M District, in the MM and/or MU-LI districts, with additional buffers from schools and residences? (23C.25.020.B and F, 23F.04.010)
 - Citywide cap (180k sq ft) and other limitations would remain
 - Concern with potential impact on other uses (e.g., manufacturers, artists)
 - Expansion beyond M District could create additional opportunities for cultivators (none currently in Berkeley)

Manufacturing Districts in Berkeley





Requirements Related to Change in Retailer Locations


- 6. Require proof of good standing prior to relocation? (23C.25.010.A.3)
 - Current regulations allow a retailer to re-locate with a Zoning Certificate and review from Cannabis Commission
 - Proposed regulations would require proof of good standing with all state/local regulations

Buffers for Storefront Retailers

- 7. Change buffer requirements? (23C.25.010.B.6)
- Alt A: 600 feet from K- 5 schools, youth centers and Storefront Retailers and 1,000 feet from 6-12 schools.
- Alt B: 600 feet from K-12 schools and Storefront Retailers (no change)
- Alt C: 1,000 feet from all schools, daycares, parks, youth centers, libraries
- Alt D: Use Alt B until the 7th Retailer is established, then change to Alt A.







Consumption Lounges

- 8. Allow consumption at Storefront Retailers? (12.22.040.F.2 and 23C.25.010.D)
 - a. Allow consumption with a Use Permit or subject to State law? (23C.25.010.D)
 - Risk of secondhand smoke and impaired driving
 - Would require amendment to the City's smoking ordinance
 - Allows a place to consume legally

Options to Consider for Delivery-Only Retailers

- Discretion
- Buffer
- Location
- Restrict Number of Businesses/Quota
- Option for Equity Businesses

Delivery-Only Retailers: Locations

- 9. Allow Delivery-Only Retailers in all M-prefixed districts or just the M District (in addition to most C-districts)? (23C.25.010.C.4)
- Planning Commission concerned with impact on other existing uses (e.g., manufacturers and artists)
- Protections exist for manufacturers and artists
- Would allow greater opportunity for Microbusinesses

Delivery-Only Retailers: Quota

- 10.Limit the number of Delivery-Only Retailers? (23C.25.010.C.1)
 - Alt A: 7, and all reserved for Equity candidates
 - Alt B: No limit
 - Alt C: 10, and at least half reserved for Equity candidates
 - Alt D: 2, and both reserved for Equity candidates

- Provide direction regarding alternatives included in the ordinance
- Adopt new ordinance language
